THE PRESIDENT'S PAGE

What is in the name? "A rose by any name may smell..." Oh well, let us leave Shakespeare behind. What is relevant now is the discussion concerning the plan in changing the name of our Association from FILIPINO ASSOCIATION OF GREATER KANSAS CITY to FILIPINO-AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF GREATER KANSAS CITY.

In our last month's meeting, honest articulation by members of our Association — pros and cons — were heard. Because of the sensitivity of the topic (and time), it was approved to table this and referred to the By-Laws Committee for review and will then be submitted for discussion by the body in our May-June meeting. Whether you are in favor of the status quo or to change the name of our Association, you should make your vote count — attend our next meeting.

There are some elders in our community who plan to go back home to the Philippines to retire. Some of them had problems or did not know how to proceed with their papers. The Philippine Consulate in Chicago suggests that if one is a U.S. citizen, he should apply for a non-quota permanent resident visa. If he is a Filipino citizen, all one has to do is renew his passport — all of these could be done by mail. If you have this problem, write the Philippine Consulate in Chicago and ask for application forms which apply to you.

We can each remember, I am sure, the confusion and problems that nagged us when we first arrived in this country. What we must also remember is that those just now arriving are experiencing the same problems that we all endured. But we can assist them over the hurdles. The setting up of house keeping is always a difficult and expensive undertaking. The new Filipino immigrant often does not possess such items as pots, pans, dishes, bedding, etc, or these items do not arrive until several weeks after the people arrive. The "settled" Filipinos could greatly ease the pains of this transitional period by setting up a pool of these items to be loaned to our newly arrived countryman.

Our FIESTA FILIPINA is here sooner than we think. A lot of hard work has been laid down for this, but there are several loose areas yet that need to be revitalized, and one of these is the advance ticket sales. Please help inject vigor by selling tickets.

Hero worship is, to me, an attribute of a people not devoid of gratitude by at least giving a gesture of remembrance to those who unselfishly suffered the supreme sacrifice so that others may reap and enjoy the alluring fragrance which radiates profusedly from the enriched life of the Motherland.

The members of the Triangular Club were aware of the club's passing away from the scene in 1949 but they kept the spirit of cooperation in matters of community concern. May 6, 1977

The meeting was called to order by Dr. Noy Sulit who began the meeting by extending recognition to the Tambuli editor, Don Ewing, for his fine job in bringing out a "happy" TAMBULI. Don Ewing, in turn, expressed gratitude for the assistance of Ami Ubalde, Jun Puno, Evelyn Cruz and Eric & Maggie Vergara.

I. SECRETARY'S REPORT - The minutes of the last meeting was approved as published in Tambuli.

II. TREASURER'S REPORT - (See printed attachment for financial statement)

Carmen Chico asked why the bowling income is not included in the consolidated sheet.

Although everybody was in agreement that the income should be in the accounting sheet,

there was no resolution as to when it will be reported. The matter will be resolved by the treasurer and the Presidents of the bowling leagues.

- III. HOSPITALITY — Mila Tiojanco was unable to attend, but sent her report via Eileen. The report stated that the "Filipinettes" are in need of help in sewing their dresses for the Fiesta (finishing touches), making of flowers, etc. Some new faces were introduced, namely: Romeo and Nanette Ibe, Pinky McMichael, Norma Limos, Somia Dispo and Lita Ocampo.
- IV. MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE — Charing Gomez reported that to date there are 165 individual members in the Association. Membership cards have already been printed and will be issued soon to paid members.
- V. SOCIAL AFFAIRS — Lillian Pardo thanked Nene Uy and Goudy Tejada for their efforts in organizing the successful Easter picnic.
- VI. SINAG-TALA — Bill Ick said that since last month, the Sinag-Tala had performed for the following organizations: Church of the Nazarene, Grandview Boy Scouts chapter, and Bader Memorial Christian Church. The Sinag-Tala also have accepted an invitation to perform in Indianapolis on July 2, 1977. Details are now being worked out.
- VII. FIESTA FILIPINA — According to the co-chairmen, Bill Ick and Lillian Pardo, everything so far is on schedule and within the budget. They also reported the following developments:
- Kim Frazier replaced Ken Bowman as Coordinator for Crown Center ethnic festivals
 - security and cleaning will be handled by the Association
 - mini-shows at the shops on June 6, 7, 8 & 9 to promote the Fiesta and sell advance tickets
 - Fashion show and reception one week before the Fiesta. The Fashion Show is open to the public, but the reception will be for paid members and guests only.
 - a lechon will be set up at the square again
 - 16-minute film of Philippine history and costume may be substituted for "Kasaysayan ng Lahi" because of the conflict in scheduling. Dr. Sulit wrote President Marcos requesting another copy of the film because of our commitments.
 - Claire Ick and Don Ewing arranged several publicity and promotions on TV for the Fiesta. (Refer to earlier Show Biz article.)
 - Don Ewing and Eric Vergara had been instrumental in cutting down our cost because of their time and efforts.
 - goods ordered from the Philippines have been received.
 - 50 Sponsors and 4 Patrons responded out of 200 persons solicited
- VIII. ENDOWMENT PLAN — A motion to accept the plan in principle was accepted. Questions regarding the plan can be directed to Don Downing.
- IX. FREADWAY ENTERPRISES — John Fread turned in \$10.00 to the Association as profit from retail sale. Angie Chico suggested that the Association pay for half of the kit for the sale of Amway products.
- X. SCHOLARSHIP FUND — Chito Tadeo reported that he had received donations from different companies already.

XI. NEW BUSINESS — The merits of changing the name of the Association was discussed but since it will require a change in the constitution, it was tabled and referred to the Constitution and By-Laws Committee for further study.

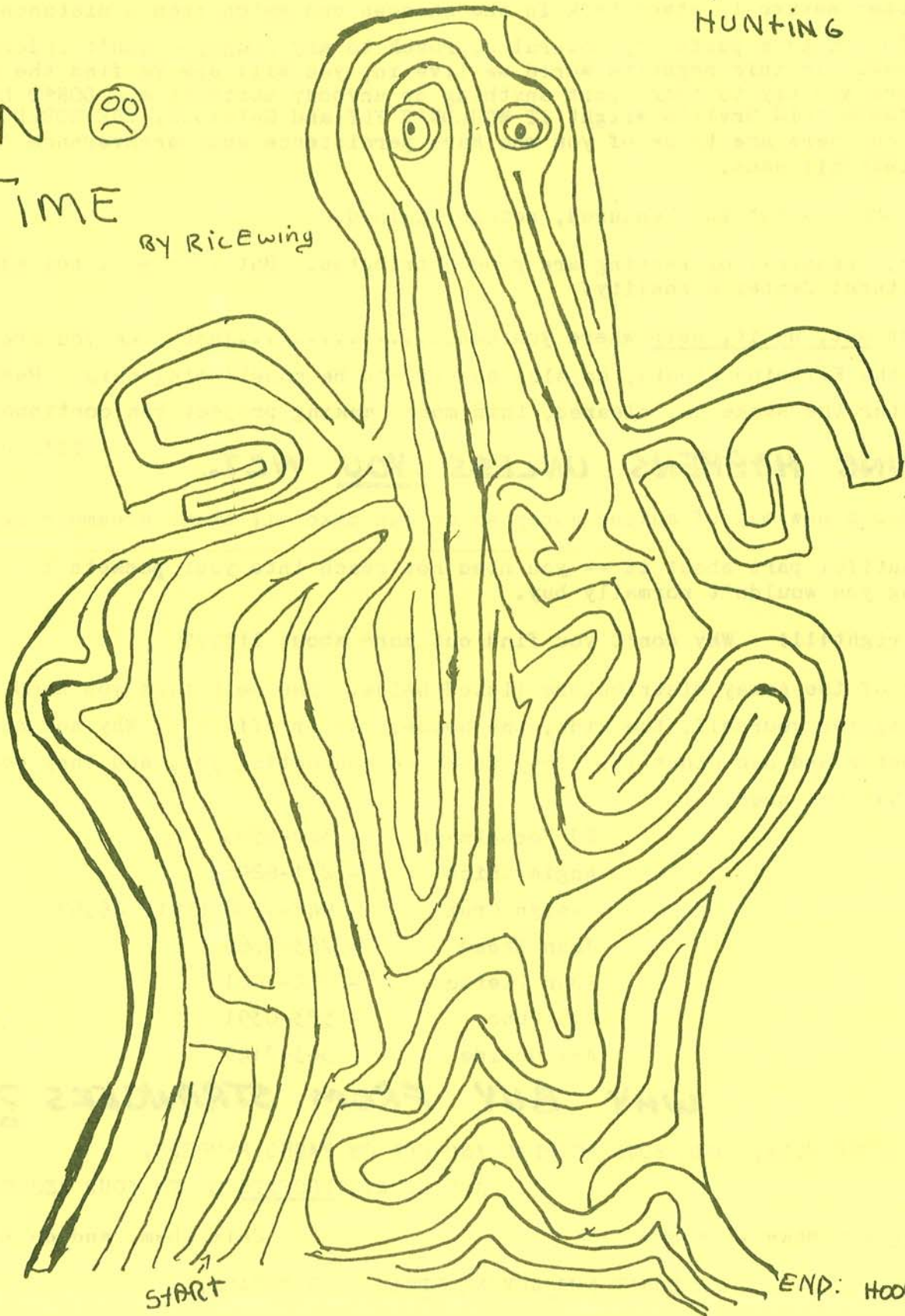

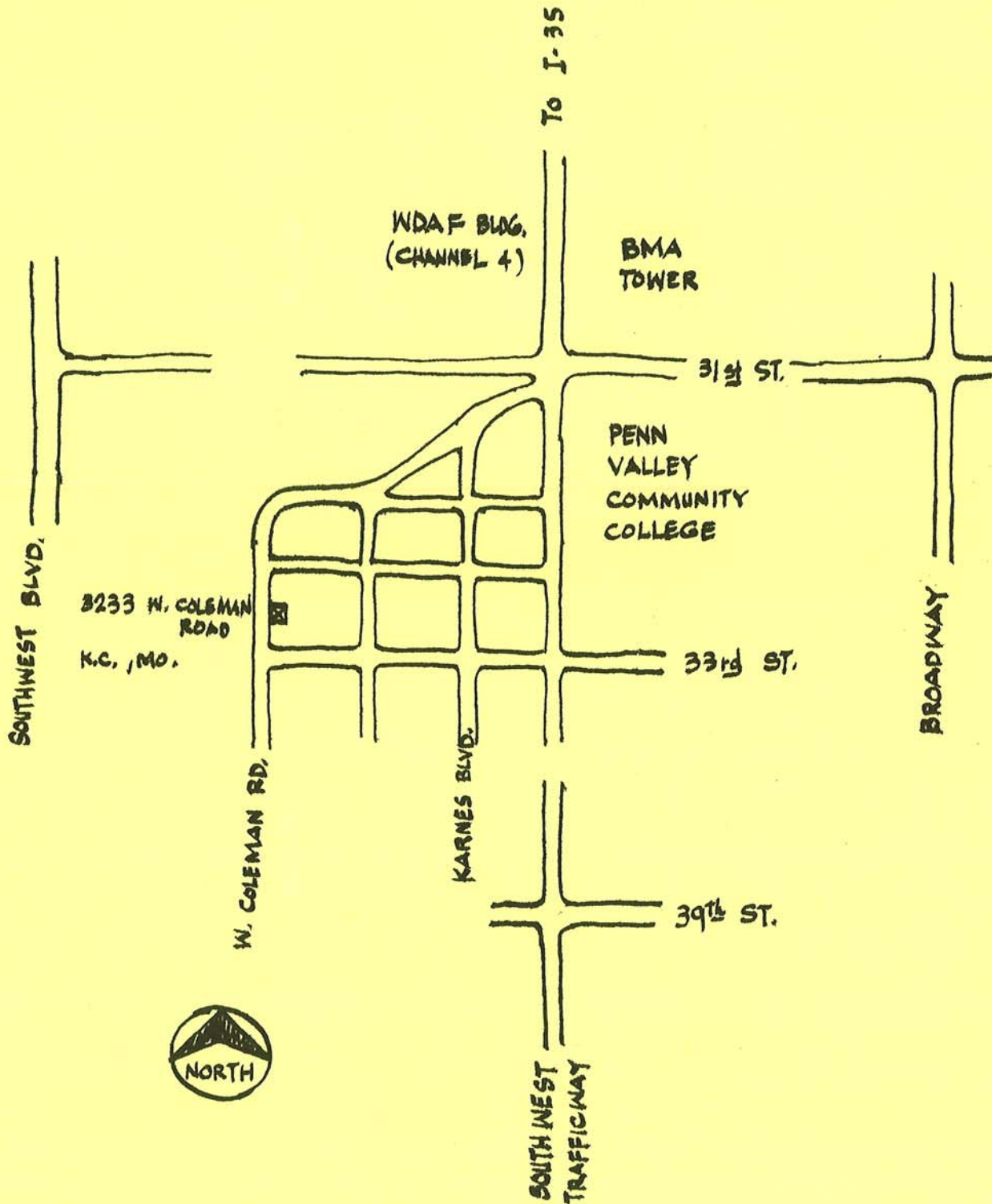
